













Bill's dad, William, started by buying out the previous Packard dealership – for \$3,500. First thing William did was take inventory, finding that he had \$5,000 worth of Packard parts. Great move! William had an ethic of providing the best service possible to his customers and the dealership prospered. In the mid '50s Packard was going south and William took up an invitation to consider the, new to the U.S., Mercedes. The connection was the Mercedes importer, Max Hoffman, was also a major player *(Continued on page 21)*

The installation evolved through the years, from an oil-fired light to electric, using the Fresnel lens to amplify the light. A foghorn and, when the technology came along, a radio beacon were also used. When the Coast Guard took over, they *(Continued on page 24)*


