Where We've Been San Rafael Warehouse Museum

Members and guests were transfixed by our host Sheldon Doing as he told the tales of how he came to acquire many of the items in his collection.

Neither the threat of rain nor the NFL playoffs could keep our members away from the chance to visit Sheldon Doing's eclectic and quirky museum packed to the ceiling with kitschy collectibles, enigmatic ephemera and crazy cars. A few of our members braved the elements bringing their Packards! New member Gary Humecke even went so far as to have the top down on his 1936 1404 Coupe Roadster!

Inside the museum, cinnamon bread treats were served along with water and coffee to fuel our curiosity as we were treated to many sites, including one of the world's largest collections of memorabilia of 1980s pop sensation Max Headroom. Other gems included artifacts from many world's fairs, including the 1915 Pan Pacific and 1939 Golden Gate international Exhibitions in San Francisco. A highlight was when Sheldon fired up one of the giant mechanical music machines, which played drums, organ pipes, an accordion and more!

But no description of Sheldon's museum is complete without discussing the cars. The main attraction for our club was the 1953 Packard Henney Ambulance, which he purchased on eBay for \$600 because it didn't run. The vehicle came with all of the ambulance

Spotlight Feature The Life and Designs of Dutch Darrin Text by Michael Hayward and grandson Brayden Hayward Photos by Clint Moore



Don Sears' stunning 1941 Packard Darrin One Eighty

Howard "Dutch" Darrin was born in Cranford, New Jersey in 1897. He got the nickname "Dutch" when his Father looked at him and said you look like "a little dutchman". At the age of 10, Darrin joined the staff of Automobile Topics Magazine and helped editors by cutting out newspaper clippings. Darrin was a pilot who served in France during WW1. Upon his discharge in 1919 he used money he saved to start Aero Limited. This was one of the nations first scheduled airline carriers. In 1923 Darrin and new business partner Thomas Hibbard sailed to Paris after exploring several opportunities they decided to form a partnership and sell luxury motorcars. The firm Hibbard & Darrin then opened a design office in Paris to design bodies to be built in Brussels. They would then target wealthy Europeans in their Minerva showroom. Darrin and Hibbard's built their custom motor coaches primarily on Rolls-Royce, Minerva, Excelsior and Isotta Fraschini chassis. The Stock market crash of 1929, ultimately, led to the demise of Hibbard and Darrin in January of 1931. The market for luxury custom coaches declined significantly during the depression. Darrin then partnered with French businessman M. Fernandez and was able to continue building and designing until 1935. He then moved to Southern California to pursue new opportunities.

In 1937 Howard Darrin relocated to Southern California at the urging of Darryl Zanuck. Zanuck was a co-founder of 20th Century Pictures, which would later become 20th Century Fox. Darrin would then open

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a coach building facility located in Hollywood at 8860 Sunset Blvd and called it Darrin Of Paris. Darrin always thought Packard was the best car built in America. The car had an amazing chassis and its classic grill was a great starting point. The initial Hollywood Darrins were built on the Packard 120 chassis , which transformed a plain Jane into a work of art.

Initially, the tops were cut off the cars and fitted with a new windshield, a three piece cast aluminum cowl and custom doors. The running boards were also removed and a 4 inch sill was added below the doors in order to add strength to the body. Both the front and rear fenders were redesigned, and the radiator shell was cut down by three inches. The cars had a padded, wrap-around dash and later models had cutdown suicide doors.

I believe the first Darrin Packard was done for actor Dick Powell. There were several celebrities who owned Darrin Packards and include: Clark Gable, Tyrone Power, Chester Morris, Errol Flynn, Preston Foster and Ann Sheridan.

A total of 16 custom bodied Packard's were built in the Sunset Blvd shop between 1937 and 1939. Finally, Darrin was able to convince Alvin Macauley, President, Packard Motor Company, to display the Hollywood Darrins in their showroom to increase sales. In 1940 the Darrin Packards first appeared in the company catalog and was advertised by Packard Motor Company. There were 3 models available: convertible Victoria, convertible sedan and a luxurious 4-door Darrin sports sedan.

Darrin was able to lease an old Auburn assembly plant in Connersville, Indiana. In 1940 a total of 65 cars were built with each one of them being a rolling advertisement for Packard styling. Darrin had built an image car worth far more in prestige to Packard than actual sales. In 1941 Darrin went on to design the Packard Clipper. In the

1950's he went on to design bodies for Kaiser. I wanted to add that my 12-year old grandson helped me in researching and writing this article.

Remembering Warren Lubich Submitted by Nancy McKinney

Warren was "ready to go" following a six-year medical odyssey. A second-generation native San Franciscan, he grew-up in the Crocker -Amazon neighborhood, attending Guadalupe Elementary School and James Denman Middle School.

His formal music education, which included classical piano and pop arranging and harmony, began at age seven. He attended Abraham Lincoln High School (1952) and received his bachelor's in biology from the University of San Francisco (1957). Childhood visits to San Francisco's movie palaces fostered a dream of someday playing the theatre pipe organ. He realized that dream in 1966 on the Wurlitzer of San Francisco's Avenue Theatre, where he entertained with music of the 1920's and 1930's, and community sing-a-longs, until 1984. Warren also played concerts and silent movie programs throughout California and across the country, and between 1980 and 2003, he performed twenty-seven concerts in England, Australia, and New Zealand. Warren recorded four albums during his music career and was a long serving volunteer with the Northern California Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society. Warren's musical talents weren't confined to the theatre pipe organ; he also played piano, calliope,

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and accordion, performing with the Red Garter Band – including at 49er football games and in civic parades – and at the Gold Dust Lounge among other venues.

Music aside, he enjoyed a 36-year career as a research scientist at the University of California, San Francisco, working in the fields of osteoporosis and hyper/hypo parathyroidism in the Department of Medicine and brain tumor research in the Department of Neurosurgery. He retired from the University in 1994, having co-authored seventeen papers.


Warren enjoyed his hobbies of vintage automobiles – Packards and Lincolns – and gardening long before his retirement. He was active with Northern California Packards and the Lincoln & Continental Owners Club. He cultivated orchids and dahlias – the official flower of San Francisco – and volunteered with the Dahlia Society in Golden Gate Park and with Filoli in Woodside. He joined the Olympic Club in 1959 and the Bohemian Club in 1999 and developed a penchant for international travel later in life.


