### Where We've Been Kansas City National Meet

Almost everything was up-to-date in Kansas City for this year's national meet, which happened June 1-6 at the Courtyard Marriott in Shawnee, KS. The last time the meet was held in the area was 1990, and those of us who attended back then were surprised at all the changes and modernization that's happened over the last 35 years. Packard enthusiasts from all over the country attended, and owners as young as 17 proudly brought cars for all to enjoy. It's heartening for those of us who have been club members for so long to see new blood in the club in their teens and 20s!

Sunday morning had us boarding buses to visit the Harry S. Truman Presidential Library, which has been recently renovated. Fascinating displays helped us recapture what is was like for Truman to be plucked out of relative obscurity to become the Vice-Presidential nominee. Then, mere weeks into his term and at the height of World War II, he became president

and learned of the Manhattan Proiect, about which he had been kept completely in the dark! We also saw a couple of his vehicles (not Packards!) and were able to visit the gravesites of both him and Bess. Sunday evening was our first taste of Kansas City BBQ when we met for the welcome banquet at the Tomahawk Hill Golf Course. Club President Craig Handley took a few minutes to express how pleased he was to see everyone - espe-

cially the large number of people attending a national meet for the first time – while we enjoyed pulled pork, turkey and all the trimmings!

Monday took us on our first trip into downtown to see the Steamboat Arabia, which was a paddlewheel ship that sank in 1856 and was entombed in the mud of the Missouri River so quickly that nearly all of the cargo was protected and preserved for more than 100 years. When the ship was un-

earthed beneath a cornfield (the river had shifted), a time capsule of clothing, boots, building materials, china, and goods even canned and champagne were extracted, originally destined all supplying stores wagon trains heading West. That evening was our first adventure in the Packards to enjoy the Trustee Appreciation Din-

ner in the quaint historic town square of Shawnee 1929. The cars looked great parked in front of the vintage businesses and gas station while we dined on tri tip and chicken.

Tuesday was truly a day of adventure when we got the full Kansas experience! First the buses took us to Union Station, an incredible train depot that has been completely restored since we last visited. Now a museum, gathering place and mall, it even features a massive model train layout, which attracted many of our group. Next we were bussed up the hill to the internationally renowned World War I Museum. which made an interesting juxtaposition to what we had learned about WWII at the Truman Library just two days prior. The real excitement came when many of us received no-

warning! Some people even heard the outdoor sirens, and shortly thereafter museum staff ushered us down into the tornado shelter areas while we waited for the storm to pass. Once we were allowed back upstairs, we continued our tour only to be sent back downstairs just 20 minutes later. Fortunately, there were no injuries or damage to cars, and kudos to the museum staff for their practiced and calm coordination of the evacuations. Tuesday evening Mark Allison gave a fascinating talk about the storied Cycle-Car his father invented and li-

Much handwringing over the weather prediction for judging day had been for naught as Thursday morning brought sun with a light breeze to the shores of Quivira Lake, where nearly 50 Packards were displayed. This also gave us a chance to inspect the Allison Cycle-Car up close. With no body, all of the suspension elements are exposed and easily seen, making for a fascinating treat! Back at the hotel in the evening, a program was put on by the Packard Proving Grounds, America's Packard Museum (Dayton, OH) and the National Packard Museum (Warren, OH) to highlight how the Packard name is being pre-

served for future generations

Friday took us on our final bus tour, this time to two car collections. First stop was the Kansas City Automobile Museum, which featured cars of all varieties, including Packard, and highlighted the history of the automobile

While it is in a somewhat small facility, they've raised nearly all the money needed to build a worldclass facility in downtown that we hope to visit the next time the national meet is held nearby. Next we visited the Armacost Museum. Started by the local Studebaker dealer, the collection includes a huge variety of Studebakers as well as other vehicles, bicycles and toys. No photos were allowed inside, however you can see much of it if you look online.
